Residential Trip to Abbey Home Farm, Cirencester

In 2015 Ashton Vale Primary was proud to receive the Food for Life Partnership Gold Award and, following this success, were awarded a residential trip to Abbey Home Farm, Cirencester.

On a cold, but sunny November day, suitcases bulging with warm clothing and wellies, ten excited Year 6 children (and adults!) arrived at Home Farm for a week of hands on organic farming. We were welcomed by Maya Hilary and Will and were quickly put to work.

Wow, what a fantastic week we all had! We had to get up early every day and worked very hard whatever the weather. Split into groups, we would be out working on the farm by 7.30 am each day or preparing breakfast.

At 9.00 am we would all meet for breakfast and chat about the first job of the day. Back to work after breakfast and then later we would all get together to prepare lunch. After enjoying lunch, we would be back out on the farm until it was time to meet and prepare tea. There was no time to be bored as we were even kept entertained in the evenings!

Just an idea of some of the activities that kept us busy:

Opened the chicken houses and collected the eggs, graded and boxed the eggs, feeding milk to the calves, forking silage to the cows, pulling crops of beetroot and carrots, milking the cows, feeding the chickens, sausage making, field walking and Will's treasure trove, truck ride and exploring the woods, building a fire, getting muddy with the pigs, tractor and trailer ride to visit the sheep and organic fields, night time walk (no torches!), crops grown under the polytunnels, grooming the horses and not forgetting a visit to the farm shop!

Also we made breakfast, lunch and tea every day using organic food from the farm. This included pizza, cheese and leek tart, meatballs and lots of different vegetable; healthy and organic food that was delicious!

It was a priceless experience for everyone, being part of a team, joining in activities and learning new skills. We saw the organic food journey from farm to fork; growing, harvesting, cooking and, of course, eating! I can safely say everyone had an amazing time and I feel very privileged to have been part of such a fantastic week. Lantern Making for the Bedminster Lantern Parade by Richard Higgs, Parent Governor

A light recipe for success: take some simple ingredients such as bamboo or willow sticks, masking tape, coloured paper, and a large pot of waterproof glue.

Method: invite gifted local artist, Alan May, to visit five local primary schools.

Encourage children, teachers and parents to get involved over two days using the above materials. Create magnificent lanterns.

Serving suggestions: Pick a dark Saturday just before Christmas, close the streets from traffic, and invite The Ambling Band, Bristol Samba and hundreds of local residents to watch.

This was the perfect recipe for the fifth Bedminster Lantern Parade which, despite strong winds, provided a fantastic community entertainment.

Two weeks before the event, Alan arrived at Ashton Vale Primary with a car full of willow withies and coloured papers. He coaxed and



encouraged children in Years 2 and 3 to create an enormous winged dragon lantern with the help of teachers and parents. The children also made a number of colourful shields and dragon eggs which were also fitted with internal lights.

On the dry, but windy night, all the lanterns were assembled, and the procession set off with the Samba band drumming at the front. Hundreds of local people lined the streets of Bedminster to cheer and encourage the schools and community groups who had made a magnificent array of lanterns.

As well as the Ashton Vale dragon there was a colourful parrot, a winged Pegasus, a flying saucer and a rocket.

The procession did a circular route from North Street to East Street, finishing at Compass Point with a colourful firework display and live music. The children and families from Ashton Vale walked proudly with the shields and colourful eggs, and were a credit to the school.
