## **Building Boats**

### **STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) By Suzanne Hayes, Parent Governor**



During Science week I was lucky enough to attend a fantastic day with our Year 6's. Mark Friend, an engineer and parent, came in for the day to run a really interesting STEM day.

The day involved designing and making boats, powered by mini electric fans, that students built themselves. At first the students sketched out their plans, then built prototypes from cardboard. Then they got their designs checked by the engineer, before being let loose with the polystyrene and glue guns!

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In January I received a last minute call which resulted in a memorable afternoon helping escort 192 children to visit the Tobacco Factory Theatre for a performance of Cinderella.

We walked the entire school (except Reception) over a mile to the Tobacco Factory in Bedminster. The older children walked in pairs, hand-in-hand with the younger ones, all wearing Hi-Vis jackets. The children were all very well behaved and listened to staff when crossing the roads.

In the theatre the children found their own seats. They all sat through a two hour performance.

For some of our Children, this may be the only visit they will get to a theatre.

They have learnt how to behave in this environment. The children watched and heard an extraordinary example of theatre at its best.

The Independent reviewed it as "A funny, heart-warming, beautiful piece of stage craft" and it truly was.

What a privilege to walk our children to a local theatre, where local acting and musical talent held them spellbound for the entire performance.

## ***Making Lanterns*** ***with Artist,*** ***Alan May***

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Parents came into school for two days to help Years 1 and 6 who worked with community artist, Alan May, to create lanterns on the theme of Roald Dahl's, James and the Giant Peach. The book has been read by the children as part of their reading week.

The biggest Lantern was a peach with the character of James on the top. Other groups built a centipede, a ladybird and a spider. The children all worked well in groups even helping other groups when they had finished theirs.

They all cleared the hall for lunch and at the end of the day; I overheard many animated discussions on how they should make the sculptures and how best to collaborate to make them work.

They all knew the book, so ideas came flowing out on how to design and colour the creatures. They listened well and followed instructions, sharing tools and materials.

We were all under the two-day time limit and as the second day neared the end all students worked quickly, helping each other to finish on time.

They had all learnt how to design and turn the drawings into 3D objects.

Simple use of tools including Willow sticks and tape, scissors, secateurs, plastic ties, then tissue and glue. The finished lanterns are beautiful, with the children feeling very proud of their efforts.

The Lantern parade itself was re-scheduled, due to bad weather, and moved to early January. On the evening it was perfect. Our lanterns looked amazing as we walked them from St Francis' Church, with Samba and marching bands, to Compass Point School.

What a great atmosphere, with all the streets en-route lined with cheering crowds and delighted children.

Well done to all who built and walked the lanterns in the evening. A fantastic event, which may be the last as funding is being cut for next year.

A massive thank you to Artist, Alan May, who once again brought artistic inspiration to our School.
